12:15-1:15 pm	HOT TOPIC #1: What is Not Said in the Classroom: Implicit Bias in Teaching Everybody has implicit bias. It is unconscious and effects student learning and outcomes. Learning about implicit bias and how to eliminate it in education will improve student outcomes, satisfaction, and potentially patient outcomes. 	HOT TOPIC #2: Writing as a Way to Build Community and Promote Self-Care Building off three years of Writing for Wellness (W4W) series that have brought HSC students, staff, and faculty together for creative writing in a communal setting, we will present findings from the series, share strategies used in the series to create community, and discuss ways the HSC community can benefit from similar efforts moving forward. We will discuss how W4W has been embedded in DEI and Wellness efforts throughout the HSC. Participants will hear from both students and faculty who have facilitated W4W, and will get a chance to do some creative writing themselves in this session. 	HOT TOPIC #3: How and Why to Decolonize Healthcare (and Ourselves) Healthcare has developed within the colonized context of the United States, largely ignoring the Indigenous health and cultural traditions of this land. The effects of this colonized way of delivering care is worth considering, particularly in a state where many of the recipients of healthcare are Indigenous themselves. The presenters - from diverse backgrounds, including policy expertise, social work and medicine - will engage the participants in a discussion around decolonization. 	HOT TOPIC #4: Navigating a Mentorship Mismatch Mentorship is a popular topic in educational and professional realms; evidence demonstrates both immediate and enduring benefits for mentees and mentors. Unfortunately, many people receive limited guidance in how to attain and sustain mentorship relationships and may face a lack of cultural or institutional support for such connections. This trend is especially profound for URIM professionals. Poor communication and unclear expectations between mentor and mentee can create conflict often compounded by a mismatch of intersectional identity and experience. Hot Topic participants will examine two examples of conflict within a mentorship relationship to identify issues, discuss possible reasons for conflict, and brainstorm solutions. Sharing personal highs and lows in mentorship, together the group will brainstorm solutions to address barriers and inspire involvement (or re-involved) in mentorship.
